GENERAL MEETING

Cal Fire's Statewide Biologist Focuses on Forest Practices, Wednesday, Jan 9 @ 7:00 pm You've heard plenty about wildfires, but you haven't heard it from Stacy Stanish, CalFire's statewide biologist focusing on forest practices. What is the interplay of fires, public health, climate change, timber production, and wildlife habitat? We've asked Stacy to give us her insight into these inter-related and important pieces of life in the North State. Come take this opportunity to build our own insight!

Second Saturday Bird Walk at Battle Creek State Wildlife Area, Jan 12 @ 8:00 am

Battle Creek State Wildlife Area has riparian and wetlands habitat that ensures a great variety for birding. During this 1/2 – day trip we expect to see a good variety of winter passerines, Bald Eagles, rails and ducks. Wear sturdy shoes. Trails are groomed but ground is uneven. Meet trip leader **Bruce Deuel** at the parking lot at Battle Creek Wildlife Area, reached by taking Hwy 5 or Hwy 273 south to Anderson, turning off at the Outlet Mall and following the signs east to Coleman Fish Hatchery.

Note: A California Lands Pass is required for the wildlife area. Passes are \$4.32 for a day pass, \$25.10 for annual pass and are available at the CDFW office on Locust Street in Redding, or anywhere hunting and fishing licenses are sold. Contact Bruce (736-0898) for details. Local Weekday Bird Walk, Thursday, January 17 @ 8:00 am Turtle Bay Exploration Park Arboretum At the North end of the Sundial Bridge is a large natural area accessible by a paved trail. Habitats include views of the Sacramento River, oak woodlands and open grassland. We will see Common Merganser, White-breasted Nuthatch, Redshouldered Hawk, Spotted and California Towhees, Western Bluebird, and returning winter resident White-crowned and Goldencrowned Sparrows. As always unusual species are probable. Meet our trip leader, David Pluth, at the Arboretum parking lot on Arboretum Drive off north Market Street at 8:00 am for this 1/2-day tour.

Wintu Audubon Outing to Arcata Marsh, Saturday, January 26 @ 10:00 am, Arcata Marsh Join retired wildlife biologist, Humboldt Bay Initiative member and Redwood Region Audubon Society Conservation Chair, Chet **Ogan**, for a full day of very informative birding at Arcata Marsh! With its unique blend of eleven man-made freshwater, brackish, and salt marshes, mudflats, open bay waters, grassland, and upland areas, Arcata Marsh & Wildlife Sanctuary has about 5 miles of mostly flat trails providing a variety of habitats which attract over 100 species of birds almost any day of the year. The walks that Chet leads typically cover about 2.5 miles and depend on weather, tides, and the possibility of unusual birds. We will learn some of the history of the marsh area, which services Arcata's WTP system.

Plan to meet at 10 am at Arcata Marsh Interpretive Center parking lot 569 South G Street, Arcata, for some birding around the marsh then break for lunch across the street at Redwood Curtain Brewery (food truck out back) 550 South G Street, Arcata. In the afternoon we will go to South I Street parking lot and watch the shorebirds march ahead of the rising tide into McDaniel Slough Restoration Area. Tides at Arcata Marsh Jan 26: low ~10:45 am (1.9 ft) high ~4:40 pm (5.9 ft). Sunrise: about 7:30, sunset about 5:30. There are several covered shelters.

FEBRUARY ACTIVITIES

Family/Beginner Bird Walk at Turtle Bay, Saturday, Feb 2 @ 9:00 am We invite beginners of all ages to our introductory walks on the first Saturday of each month. Second Saturday Bird Walk at Clear Creek Wastewater Treatment Ponds, Feb 9 @ 8 am We are again scheduling a visit to the ponds targeting wintering waterfowl and very early migrating shorebirds. We hope that the winter rains will provide abundant open water and muddy shorelines for these species. Assemble at the Treatment Plant's Administration Building at the end of Metz Road at 8:00 am to meet your leader, David Pluth. This is a 1/2-day trip that may end in the early afternoon if the birding is good. Directions to the Clear Creek Plant: Take Hwy 273 and look for River Ranch Road after crossing Clear Creek. Cross over the Railroad tracks and turn left on Eastside Rd. Entrance is on Metz Road on the right.

GENERAL MEETING

The Pacific Crest Trail from Mexico to Canada, Wednesday, Feb 13 @ 7:00 pm The west coast wilds contain worlds of beauty, and there's nothing like a good walk for an exhilarating and up-close experience of it. One of Wintu Audubon's own, **Zach Winchell**, took that long walk along the Pacific Crest Trail last summer, from Mexico to Canada. Come share a view of the adventure through his photographs!



Great Backyard Bird Count, Friday, Feb 15 – Monday, Feb 18

Help researchers at Audubon Society and the Cornell Lab or Ornithology gather important

data on bird populations. Spend at least 15 minutes (no upper time limit!) and record bird sightings in your own backyard or favorite birding place. For more information and to record your findings, go to <u>birdcount.org</u>.

Local Weekday Bird Walk at Lema Ranch -Thursday, February 21 @ 8:00 am Lema **Ranch** offers a variety of habitats, from ponds to open fields, to woodlands attracting many species of birds. In February, the winter ducks (sometimes including the exquisite Hooded Merganser) and winter sparrows will still be lingering and the earliest spring migrants may have begun to appear, such as Tree Swallow. A specialty of the park is Common Gallinule. Larry Jordan's bluebird trail produces (sometimes numerous) Western Bluebirds. Various raptor species are possible such as American Kestrel, Red-tailed Hawk and Merlin. Please join trip leader Linda Aldrich in the parking lot reached from Shasta View to Hemmingway at 8:00 am for an interesting mid-week bird walk.

Board Meetings are held on the first Wednesday of the Month at 7:00 PM at One Safe Place. All members are urged to attend to contribute information and new ideas.

Wintu Audubon Society General Meetings are on the second Wednesday of the month at 7:00 PM at One Safe Place, 2250 Benton Drive, Redding. The public is invited.

Wintu Audubon Outing to Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge, Saturday, February 23 @ 7:30 am The Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge is a national gem, well worth the short, 90-mile drive to Willows. Enormous numbers of waterfowl fill the sky and the impoundments in fall and winter. Snow, Ross's and Greater White-fronted Geese, Northern Pintails, Northern Shovelers and Gadwalls are assured. Possibilities are White-faced Ibis, Green-winged and Cinnamon Teal, Blacknecked Stilts and various raptors, including Bald Eagle and Peregrine Falcon. Most of the birding is done from cars. We will provide 2-way radios to report sightings and alert people in other cars to look for them.

Meet your leader at **7:30 am sharp** at Kutras Park on Park Marina Drive to carpool and bring a lunch for this full-day trip. Fees to enter the refuge are \$6 per car for the day. Most carpool drivers have senior lifetime passes and can enter for no additional fee. For more information call **Larry Jordan** at 949-5266.

TRIP REPORTS

Thursday, November 15 at Clover Creek Preserve Field Trip

Eight birders (including 2 visitors from Vancouver, Canada) met in the Preserve's parking lot under chilly, smoky skies, reduced visibility and drought conditions. The "best birds" were a first-of-season Say's Phoebe; and about a half dozen Wilson's Snipe. We first spotted 3 of the latter probing the mud with their long, curved beaks. From a different vantage point we picked out their striped bodies as they walked along the water's edge in front of lowgrowing vegetation. Whenever they stopped, they disappeared thanks to their cryptic plumage. In all, we saw 30 species – but what we lacked in variety was made up in quantity with at least 45 Savannah Sparrows to comb through looking for White-crowned, Goldencrowned, Song and Lincoln's Sparrows.

Thursday, Nov 10 at Cascade Park

Wintu Audubon Society Birders are hardy souls. A group of ten birders met at the Cascade Park Parking Lot at 8:00 AM. on Saturday 10th. The day was clear, but the temperature registered at 34 degrees. We began our tour with the sun on our backs enjoying approximately 35 Western Bluebirds and 10 or more Yellow-rumped Warblers in a very large Valley Oak tree. There were 10 knowledgeable birders in the group who helped identify 40 species of birds.

Besides Passerines, we saw quite a few waterfowl and several species of raptors in the air. After birding Cascade Park, the group went to bird Carrolls' Bird Feeders where we counted quite a few Mallard ducks and numerous Lesser and American Goldfinches. By the time the group arrived at Carrolls, the temperature had soared to 60 degrees and heavy outer layers of jackets could be removed. It was a FUN morning. - Jeannette Carroll

Saturday, December 1 - Turtle Bay

Saturday morning found nine intrepid birdwatchers braving the nippy weather to participate in the Family/Beginner bird walk. Redding's typical beautiful skies and Shasta Bally's frosting of snow greeted our group, as well as welcomed back the fall waterfowl migration to Turtle Bay. We identified 42 species, with identification and counting of the waterfowl made difficult by the sheer numbers. We also had the pleasure of observing a gang of seven Snowy Egrets sharing an islet in the river with a Great Blue Heron, who finally felt outnumbered and took off. Raptors were represented by Red-shouldered and Red-tailed Hawks and five individual Ospreys, including one carrying the fruits of a successful fishing expedition.

The highlight of the morning was the sighting of a Phainopepla, a rare bird for our area and a first sighting for me. Fortunately, Larry came with his spotting scope, and Mr. Phainopepla was patient enough to allow all of us to have a great view of him.

I continue to be amazed at the natural beauty of our community and the diverse wildlife even within sound of the freeway and am grateful for the opportunity that these bird walks provide us to get out and appreciate it with others. Please join us! - John Winchell
