Local Mid-Week Bird Walk Battle Creek Wildlife Area

Thursday, May 18 @ 8:00 am The California Dept. of Fish and Wildlife has restored riparian habitat and maintains trails along Battle Creek including a connecting trail through a marsh to the Coleman National Fish Hatchery. Eagles and other raptors, marsh dwellers and passerines are usually seen. We meet at the parking lot at Battle Creek Wildlife Area, reached by taking Hwy 5 or Hwy 273 south to Anderson, turning off at the Outlet Mall and following the signs east to Coleman Fish Hatchery. Trip Reports

Youth/Beginner Walk. March 4 Twentyfour species were observed in the rain on the Turtle Bay loop. A seventh grader and his mom found a few American Coots and many Mallards, all of them paired, swimming over what is normally dry land. A handful of Buffleheads, Common Goldeneyes, Common Mergansers, and Double-crested Cormorants dotted the muddy water. Along the shore a Green Heron poked about. Three woodpecker species tapped at tree trunks. Yellow-rumped Warblers, Ruby-crowned Kinglets, and three Bewick's Wrens gleaned the brush and trees. From the sparrow clan, a couple California Towhees and good number of Song Sparrows braved the wet weather. A single Anna's Hummingbird buzzed by, but the gray weather declined to light his gorget.

2nd Saturday Bird Walk. March 11 A beautiful morning, a Lark Sparrow and Western Bluebirds greeted eleven birders at **Lema Ranch.** California Scrub Jays, American Robins, Yellow-rumped Warblers, Black Phoebes and several members of the dove family got us started. The ponds produced Gadwalls, American Wigeons, Mallards,

Buffleheads, Ring-neck Ducks, a Lesser Scaup, a Ruddy Duck, and American Coots. We were excited to spot a Common Gallinule with its bright vermillion beak. Doublecrested Cormorants, Pied-bill Grebes, Belted

Kingfisher, and Killdeer were there also. The woodpecker family was well-represented with 5 species. Raptors were scarce except an American Kestrel that posed again and again making sure we all got a good long look. In all 53 species were counted. A few new to Wintu birders joined us.

Third Thursday Walk

Battle Creek, March 23 Despite fog, thirty-eight degrees, dewy grass that soaked through shoes and socks, the birding was great! Battle Creek was not stingy for eight birders who walked upcreek and around the marsh. The riparian woodlands sang with House Wrens and Oak Titmice. Orangecrowned and Yellow-rumped Warblers added color, along with California Scrub-Jays and American Robins. Five woodpecker species included a Red-breasted Sapsucker. At the canal, a bright Belted Kingfisher startled both us and itself, and took off with barely a touch-down. The marsh was sprinkled with Red-winged Blackbirds, Marsh Wrens, a Wilson's Snipe, and a couple of heard-butnot-seen Soras. Nine species of swimming birds, included Common Gallinules and a late Common Golden-eye. The group found

the sun halfway back from the marsh, and with it soaring birds that brought the raptor count to four, a few Tree and Northern Rough-winged Swallows, and helped us see clearly the pair of Fox Sparrows that brought the sparrow species count to five—not including the Spotted Towhees that trilled to us out and back. Forty-nine species in all.

March 31 – Wintu goes to school! Dan Greaney & Sally NeSmith were invited to join Dan Gunther and his five science classes for a day of birding on the Sequoia Middle School campus. Each class seemed to find new birds to discover. Canada Geese were always present as well as American Crows, Common Ravens and Western Bluebirds. Some classes were regaled by a Bewick's Wren singing its head off and some glimpsed Ruby-crowned Kinglets, Anna's Hummingbirds, both Say's and Black Phoebes. Mockingbirds and California Scrub-Jays were present and noisy. There was a lot of student enthusiasm, although some of that was just being outside for science class!

Youth/Beginner Walk, April 1 April Fool's notwithstanding, twenty birders - half adults and more than half youths! – enjoyed a normal day of spring birding. And fortunately, normal includes a whole lot of wonderful! From our thirty-three species observed, a few highlights: the bright charcoal and-lemon Yellow-rumped Warbler who offered some startling views; the busy Rubycrowned Kinglets who did not; the Bald Eagle head poking above her nest; the handful of students who, binoculars up, stalked a few Sparrows and discovered their golden crowns!; the solitary green-headed Mallards who paddled about; the swirls of Tree Swallows, eyebrow-flashing California Scrub-Jays, and a Double-crested Cormorant hanging out to dry. It was beautiful, fun, and every day should be so normal!

2nd Saturday Bird outing to Millville Plains April 18 was cancelled due to rain.

April 13 Breaking Point movie screening was a success. Held in McConnell Foundation's beautiful conference center, Desiree Loggins of the California Audubon presented this award-winning documentary to a full house. The Salton Sea is in demise and California Audubon is working to help mitigate the impact on the many Pacific Flyway migratory birds that use this area. She urged action and also encouraged all to visit this fascinating area.

Mid-Week Birding, Thursday, April 20 to the Mouth of Cottonwood Creek State Wildlife Area Rained out.

Whole Earth & Watershed Festival,

April 22 Wintu Audubon members staffed three booths at the Festival and participated in the March for Science. At our own booth many volunteers filled out Bea Currie's team. Some highlights: Chad Scott reported that he gave away over 200 hummingbird feeders; Jeannette and Harvey Carroll again set up their information-rich nest/poster display across the walk, which drew a steady stream of thoughtful visitors; and the Quail Call Team, standing in the mud section of



the City Hall lawn, led visitors, mostly children, in making some 350 calls. Larry Jordan, with Bill Oliver's help, staffed the Center for Biological Diversity booth.

Special thanks to Chuck Smith and Larry for preparing thirty nesting box kits, which Larry and Dan Greaney helped festival-goers assemble at the fair's STEAM booth, to put up at their own homes. The Festival director has already requested a repeat performance. *Great job and thanks to all!*

NEWSWORTHY EVENTS

Larry Jordan reports that the Burrowing Owl project on Nord-cana Highway is doing well. He went there and cleared off the weeds growing in front of the burrows. Larry oversees this project funded in part by California Audubon. There are 24 burrows diligently dug by volunteers and lined with 4 inch perforated Corex tubing. He saw one owl in front of a burrow. Although he found evidence of an owl lost to a predator, he heard a young owl "rattle snake" alarm call coming from inside a burrow indicating reproductive success.
