Local Weekday Bird Walk at the Arboretum, Thursday, May 16 @ 8:00 am Meet trip leader Sally NeSmith (831-535-2888) at the Carl & Leah McConnell gate (Arboretum Drive off of North Market) for a meander through the Arboretum, over the Sundial Bridge and back along the river trail. Several types of Woodpeckers, Towhees, Goldfinches, and Warblers will be observed as well as the nesting Osprey family. Red-shouldered Hawks, Wood Ducks and the Common Yellowthroat may be present.

Lassen Campout

July 26–27, Lost Creek Campground We have enjoyed the birding and camping at the Lost Creek Group Campground for several years, so we are scheduling this event again this year in conjunction with Altacal Audubon. Group Camp site #5 has been reserved for the nights of Friday, July 26 and Saturday, July 27. We are inviting the Redwood Region, Peregrine, Mendocino, Plumas and Redbud Chapters to join us.

Species expected include Osprey, Pileated Woodpecker, White-headed Woodpecker, Black-backed Woodpecker, Williamson's Sapsucker, Vaux's Swift, Common Night-hawk, Bufflehead, Gray Jay, Brown Creeper, American Dipper, Mountain Bluebird, Yellow Warbler, Western Tanager and Cassin's Finch.

We will bird Manzanita Lake and vicinity on Saturday morning. The rest of the itinerary is open and will depend on the interests of the participants. Folks can either camp at Lost Creek or drive up for either or both Saturday and Sunday. Campers can arrive at the campsite at a time of their choosing on Friday after 1pm. Saturday day trippers should meet at the Kutra's Park meeting

place at 8:00 am Saturday morning to car pool. Day trippers for Sunday, July 28, will meet at the campsite at 9:00 am.

TRIP REPORTS

Mid-Week Walk at Mary Lake, March 21

A brisk and birdy morning greeted seven birders during this spring stroll around Mary Lake. Nancy, one birder wrote, "Wow how many species were identified?" (48!!) "It's amazing that one of the smallest birds (Bushtit) was sighted in the largest of numbers. My favorite was learning how to identify the Lesser Goldfinch and my first sighting of Spotted Towhee where I actually saw the spots! It was a great group." Indeed, with the fire having cleared out some of the underbrush, we saw an abundance of birdlife. Quail, Green-winged Teal, Wood Ducks, Mallards, Coots, and Ruddy Ducks were in attendance and an Osprey soared and danced overhead.

Beginner/Family Bird Walk

Turtle Bay, April 6 While the steady rain did not portend much of a turnout for our monthly Family bird walk, I was happily surprised that not only did the rain pause as I drove into parking area at Turtle Bay, I was also met by two enthusiastic and intrepid birders. We decided to take advantage of the break in the weather to do an out and back to the eagle nest to see if any eagles had returned. While no eagles were sighted, our chapter mascot, the Belted Kingfisher greeted us, some water fowl remained, particularly Mallards, Ring-Necked Ducks, and Buffleheads, and we got a close encoun-

ter with a Sharp-shinned Hawk, that roosted below us. And while I am no Warbler expert, the extent of my sure identification being the Yellow-rumped Warbler because of his "yellow rump", I believe we saw a pair of Townsend's Warbler due to dark mask and crown with bright yellow around face and upper body. But I defer to the experts. Regardless, it seems whenever we make the time to spend time time in the outdoors, and look around us, we are treated to something new and inspiring

Gray Davis Dye Creek Preserve offers only limited public access, so it was unfortunate that only four brave birders made the trek up the canyon on what turned out to be a gorgeous, clear and warm day. The birding actually began at Cone Grove Park, on the way to the preserve, where we tallied 26 species, including Wood Duck, Cliff Swallow, and the California endemic Yellow-billed Magpie. Traveling south on Foothill Road to the preserve entrance we added several species to the list including Cinnamon Teal, American Wigeon, many Wilson's Snipe, a telemetry-collared Ross's Goose and several Tricolored Blackbirds. Dye Creek Preserve itself showed us 41 species for a total of 62 for the trip. The best sightings at Dye Creek were a Vesper Sparrow, Peregrine Falcon and Golden Eagle, topped off with a singing Canyon Wren!


Publishing congratulations are in order for some Wintu members.

Blue Bird Nesting Boxes

Those of us that use the Sacramento River



Trail upriver from the Diestlehorst Bridge may have noticed the presence of bird boxes in the vicinity of Middle Creek road on the south side of the trail. Larry Jordan, of

been working on supporting the populations of nesting birds in Northern California for some time, by supplying bird nesting habitat



not only for cavity nesters such as Western Bluebirds and Tree Swallows, but for Burrowing Owls as well. With the support of local suppliers and craftsman who supplied the nesting boxes to the Audubon Society, Larry led the project to install an additional eighteen nest boxes in the area between the River Trail and the Sacramento River near the end of Middle Creek Road. This area had been burned by the Carr Fire with subsequent loss of nesting sites for cavity nesting birds.

We carefully monitor these nests each week, to record activity, as well as to perform any maintenance tasks that need to take place. This usually takes less than a minute per nest, and does not adversely impact the nesting birds, although the birder performing this task may have an up close and personal encounter with the would-be parents. Lots of ducking of dive-bombing swallows!

While we do not have any eggs in any of the boxes as yet, tree swallows have built full

nests in two boxes so far, and we anticipate the arrival of eggs soon. Nesting material has been found in several others. More to come as this exciting project continues.
