General Meeting - The Birds of Cambodia, Wednesday, October 9th @ 7pm

We all get to see our North American birds. Some of us slip down to South America, and few make it over to Europe or Africa. But rarely do we see the birds of Asia! Andrea Claassen, now working for the Western Shasta Resource Conservation District, will share the birds of Cambodia with us. Come join us for this view of the other side of the world.

Second Saturday Bird Walk at Clear Creek Wastewater Treatment Ponds, Saturday October 12th @ 8 am

We are again scheduling a visit to the ponds hoping to find migrating waterfowl, shorebirds

and passerines. Assemble at the Treatment Plant's locked gate at the end of Metz Road at 8:00 **OR** meet at



Kutras Park at 7:30 am to carpool with your leader, **Larry Jordan**. This is a 1/2-day trip that may end in the early afternoon if the birding is good. Directions to the Clear Creek Plant: Take Hwy 273 and look for River Ranch Road after crossing Clear Creek. Cross over the Railroad tracks and turn left on Eastside Rd. Entrance is on Metz Road on the right.

Local Weekday Bird Walk, Thursday, October 17th @ 8:00 am at Turtle Bay Exploration Park Arboretum

Meet trip leader **Sally NeSmith (831-535-2888)** at the Carl & Leah McConnell gate (Arboretum Drive off of North Market) for a meander through the Arboretum, over the Sundial Bridge and back along the river trail. Acorn Woodpeckers, Anna's Hummingbirds, towhees, some raptors, and warblers are always present. We'll look for early fall migrants and check out the waterfowl along the river.

Wintu Audubon Outing to Ash Creek State Wildlife Area, Saturday, October 26th @ 7:00 am

Ash Creek is one of the most remote, least improved, and most pristine of all of California Department of Fish and Wildlife Areas. Located in the heart of Big Valley, these approximately 14,400 acres preserve freshwater wetlands created by the seasonal flow of six streams, including Ash Creek. In addition to 3,000 acres of natural wetlands, other natural communities upland sagebrush. Highlights of our trip last year were 100 Sandhill Cranes and on previous visits, Swainson's Hawk, Prairie Falcons and Sage Grouse. Bring lunch and water. The weather may be cool so bring warm clothes. And remember that this is a State Wildlife Area and an entrance permit is required. Meet your leader Bill Oliver 941-7741 at 7:00 am sharp at Kutras Park on Park Marina Drive to carpool.

TRIP REPORTS

Beginner/Family Bird Walk at Turtle Bay, Saturday, May 4th

It was a warm June morning for birdwatching, but 3 determined birders joined me for a lovely Saturday morning Audubon birdwalk. Temperatures were already in the 80's when we met at 9:00am, but we ventured out to see what we could find. We started out along the ponds on the 44 Trail & saw some of the usual suspects including a few Spotted Towhees, California Scrub-Jays, Tree Swallows, Anna's Hummingbirds, Canada Geese, and Mallards. We heard & saw several Yellow-billed Magpies who recently built a nest near the eagle's nest and seem to be thriving in their new home. We headed down the Turtle Bay Bird Sanctuary Trail toward the river & saw several Turkey Vultures and an Osprey soaring overhead with a fish, and a Common Merganser in the river. The temperatures were warming up & the bird activity was at a standstill so we looped around through the middle trail & called it a day!

Oregon Gulch Walk, Saturday May 11th

The scrub-country of southwest Redding had plenty to hide, and like a striptease, she showed only some of it: thirty-nine species. The showy frills included the song and dance of Western Kingbirds and Ash-throated Flycatchers, some striking Bluebirds, aerial displays of Acorn Woodpeckers, and the riparian flight of ten Mallards, all to a Grosbeak serenade. Smaller birds initially included foraging Bushtits, Titmice, Nuthatches, Tree Swallows, House Wrens, and a staid Wood Pewee. Then the show picked up. A few highlights: Chipping and Lark Sparrows, a pair of Red-shouldered Hawks, four migrating Townsend's Warblers, Lazuli Buntings, two singing Wrentits, and an elusive Blue-gray Gnatcatcher. The half-heard songs and halfseen shadows that remained unidentified beckon for another trip to Oregon Gulch!

Local Weekday Bird Walk at Turtle Bay Arboretum, Thursday, May 16th

A blustery, windy morning did not deter seven birders. The Arboretum was partially closed off due to laying down new irrigation systems, so we meandered through the main path, then walked over Sulphur Creek to the loop behind Turtle Bay School where the rain started and cut our trip short. We still observed 28 species. Raptors included a Red-shouldered Hawk, a ragged looking Red-tail Hawk, an Osprey and a Cooper's Hawk. After hearing the delightful call of a Bewick's Wren for a long time, we finally sighted one, then another. Tree, Cliff, and Violet-green Swallows were on the wing by the hundreds lending their chattery songs to the wind. A Wood Peewee and an Ash-throated Flycatcher were special treats. We were all happy to sight several Phainopepla of the Silky Flycatcher family. Western Kingbirds and a few Robins were sighted as we scurried back to the cars through the rain.- Sally NeSmith

Wintu Audubon Outing to Burney Falls, Saturday, May 25th

Seven birders gathered on a day when the threatened rain never materialized. 26 species were identified in a loop trail walk around the falls and a rim trail walk to Lake Britton after lunch in the picnic grounds. It was exciting to see the Black Swifts who nest behind the falls in late spring. We saw 9 flying high above the falls pool. A Vaux's Swift patrolled Burney Creek below the falls. The Osprey were nesting in an area visible from the rim trail, and there were 4 White-Headed Woodpeckers and 1 Pileated Woodpecker seen. We saw 3 Pacific Wrens, one was kind enough to stay visible long enough for the scope to focus while he was singing his heart out. There was also a spring bouquet of warblers: Nashville, Yellow, Yellowrumpled and Hermit. We had a long and satisfying day in this lovely Park.

Lassen Volcanic National Park Campout, July 26th thru 28th

Thirteen lucky birders enjoyed a very comfortable and leisurely stroll around Manzanita Lake on Saturday morning tallying 33 species. After spotting four Vaux's Swifts flying overhead, we took a short side trail down to Manzanita Creek where a very cooperative American Dipper gave excellent views to several participants, some seeing this exceptional species for the first time! Western Wood-Pewees seemed to be everywhere as we counted nine in all, not to be outdone by eleven Yellow-rumped Warblers. A Bald Eagle and Osprey were seen chasing each other above as several Tree Swallows foraged the skies a bit closer. Four Warbling Vireo were spotted as well as Orange-crowned, Yellow, Yellow-rumped and Hermit Warblers.



Back at the campsite several adventurous campers decided to try to find "Lost" Creek. Heading through the woods with nothing but determination and a topo map, more than a half dozen brave birders climbed over downed trees and, for the most part avoided danger, to discover that Lost Creek which was crystal clear and freezing cold. In addition to finding a Dipper in the creek we spotted several birds on the way including a Cooper's Hawk and Goldencrowned Kinglet.

On Sunday morning few of us searched the Noble Trail burned area including Hat Creek for Black-backed Woodpeckers but found none. We did however find Mountain Bluebirds, a Wilson's Warbler and a Red-breasted Sapsucker! - Larry Jordan Federal rollbacks of the Endangered Species Act are weakening protections for birds and imperiled wildlife. Keep California strong in the fight to uphold the law here at home.
